




# ST MARY'S CATHOLIC NURSERY, INFANT & JUNIOR SCHOOLS NEWSLETTER JUNE 2016

#### Dear Parents/ Carers

We are one newsletter away from the end of term, how does that happen every year? So much to plan for in September and then it goes in a flash!

This month has been no exception to the others. Every year group has been very busy, making good things happen. We have held two meetings for new parents to Reception and Nursery, welcoming new families into our special community. Year 2 have been familiarising themselves with the junior site- they look like Year 3 children already.

## School Office

Please be reminded that only prescribed medicines can be given in school by school staff (if prescribed four times a day). All other medicine will need to be administered by a parent or nominated person. For those with asthma, we have been advised that all children should have a small spacer in school and your child should know how to use the inhaler and spacer. This should be in a sealed clear plastic bag with your child's name on and you are responsible for taking this home half termly to clean.

Please remember that any absence from school must be reported to the school office on the morning by telephone (not by email) followed up in writing. Also, please advice the school office if someone other than your normal contacts is going to collect your child by phoning before 2pm. If later than this we can not guarantee getting the message to your child when calling late in the school day.

Whilst some children were performing, the rest of the year group enjoyed sculpting with model magic in order to make a chosen animal in its habitat.



The children were thrilled with their final year 4 trip to Brighton. They explored the Sea Life Centre, learning even more about the range of habitats at the coast and the wildlife that occupy them. All the while gasping and exclaiming every step of the way at the animals and information they encountered. Afterwards, they surveyed Brighton's coast line to complete their study of Brighton as a coastal city. Thinking hats helped the children to contemplate how a coastal city compares and contrasts with a city like London. A trip they'll never forget.

We are all reflecting on our progress and successes in year 4 and the adventures to come in year 5.

# News from Year 5

On Friday 24<sup>th</sup> June, Year 5 took part in an 'Under Canvas' camping experience in the school grounds! The children had the responsibility of setting up camps in groups as well as setting up tents for their teachers! They took part in team building games through the day and were treated to a slice of pizza and songs around the campfire. The children really enjoyed having the responsibility of looking after their tents and also staying away from home for the night. In RE we started our topic on Freedom and Responsibility and we will be thinking about how we can be a steward in God's creation. Year 5 have been reading the Highwayman in English and exploring the figurative language that is used by the poet Alfred Noyes to describe the Highwayman on his travels! Our Geography topic is linked to the Olympics where we are leaning about the countries of South America and their natural resources such as oil in Venezuela. We are working hard in these last few weeks of term in order to prepare for the challenges ahead in year 6.

Great news - tickets are now on sale for the Scratch Youth Messiah from the Royal Albert Hall website. Please find the link below, and do spread the word!


The choir are performing at the Scratch Youth Messiah on Sunday 27th November 2016 at the Royal Albert Hall at 2pm.

Inspiring young London

May was Walk to school once a week month and school councillors were busy collecting data for every child in their class, every day, for the entire month. Thank you, school councillors. JTA's organised the data and the results are below. Congratulations to 4 Ash you will be receiving the WOW trophy (at the awards assembly) to look after until



Unicef Thursday 23<sup>rd</sup> June was the European Union membership referendum. Throughout the school (using white, black, yellow and green hats) children debated what staying or leaving, as members of the European Union, could mean for citizens of Great Britain. They also reflected on their learning about the values of modern Britain, remembering that we should respect the views and opinions of others even if they are not the same as our own. Finally, all children, present in school that day, were able to vote in the hall at lunch time (democracy). School councillors prepared for the day and they facilitated the polling station helping children understand how to vote so that their votes would not be invalid.

Student councillors counted votes: 120 pupils voted to remain in the EU and 38 pupils chose to leave. 22 votes were invalid as they weren't marked correctly and 81 children chose not to vote. School councillors finished their work communicating the results to each class and showing them on a Power Point in the dining hall the next day.
