




# ST MARY'S CATHOLIC FEDERATION, CARSHALTON NEWSLETTER NOVEMBER 2016

It is hard to believe that we are already in the second week of Advent, enjoying crisp frosts and clear blue skies. Our run up to Christmas runs tightly up to the holidays, allowing us maximum time to celebrate the birthday of Jesus in school, informally or in our concerts and services. #### Nursery & Infant School

We celebrated the Feast of All Saints with a Mass at the junior school, thank you to Father Jim from the parish of Our Lady of the Rosary, Sutton. Well done to the Infant children for their beautiful singing during Mass. We gathered together in the school hall on the  $11^{th}$  November for 2 minutes silence in remembrance of all who died fighting for their country. Representatives from the School Council went with Mrs Quinn to the War Memorial in Carshalton to lay wreaths made by the Infant children from Breakfast and After School Club. We also had a visitor from Sutton Schools Work who came in to present an assembly on The Good Samaritan. Thank you Sarah and we look forward to welcoming her again next term.

## Junior School

Before telling you what *has* happened this month, a short announcement about what *will be* happening during Advent. Last year the children were introduced to Lectio Divina; a way of praying the scriptures. It's a time of quiet reflection which is so often needed during the busyness of Christmas preparations. This year parents/carers are also invited to Advent prayer sessions which will be based on Lectio Divina. The first one was held on Thursday 1<sup>st</sup> December at 2.45pm in the Chapel. Please sign in at the school office in the usual way. Hopefully more parents will find the time to join us.

On 1<sup>st</sup> November the Infant and Junior children came together at the Junior School to celebrate the Feast of All Saints. Many thanks to Father Jim for being our celebrant for this Mass.

We are blessed with our Chaplaincy Team which continues to grow in membership – and ideas! This month they wrote and presented an assembly to the Junior School in which they introduced themselves, explained what the Chaplaincy Team does and gave the important message that Jesus is our super-hero. If we allow Him to work through us, amazing things can happen.

Sunday 20<sup>th</sup> November, the Feast of Christ the King, marked the end of the Year of Mercy. In acknowledgement of this, and in response to Pope Francis's call to reach out to refugees, we took the opportunity to discover a little more about the plight of refugees around the world & to pray for them. The chapel was open throughout the day for pupils and staff to go on a short 'pilgrimage' of hope; a time of prayer and an opportunity to write message of hope. These will be sent to CAFOD for them to be distributed to refugees around the world.

You may have noticed that many of us wore red items on Wednesday 23<sup>rd</sup> November - Red Wednesday. This was to show solidarity with, and a reminder to pray for, people around the world who are being persecuted for their religion. Many landmarks around the world were lit up red on this day; some notable ones are the Trevi Fountain in Rome; Westminster Abbey & Westminster Cathedral in London, Holy Cross Church in Carshalton.

Advent is here and so are the travelling cribs which will be going home to each family for an evening during the remaining weeks of this term. Please take some time to reflect with your child on the coming of Jesus and use the crib as a focal point for prayer.

#### Health & Safety

#### School Office

Please be reminded that only prescribed medicines can be given in school by school staff (if prescribed four times a day). All other medicine will need to be administered by a parent or nominated person. For those with asthma, we have been advised that all children should have a small spacer in school and your child should know how to use the inhaler and spacer. This should be in a sealed clear plastic bag with your child's name on and you are responsible for taking this home half termly to clean.

Please remember that any absence from school must be reported to the school office on the morning by telephone (not by email) followed up in writing. Also, please advice the school office if someone other than your normal contacts is going to collect your child by phoning before 2pm. If later than this we can not guarantee getting the message to your child when calling late in the school day.

## Spare clothing

This is a reminder that if your child is given any spare items of clothing from the school office or classroom can you please ensure they are washed and returned so that we have them to use for other children who may need them in the future. Thank you.

Please remember to keep up to date with payments on Parentpay ensuring you pay enough money on to your child's account in advance. If you receive an email reminder from the school please ensure you act promptly should a debt have incurred.

# NURSERY & INFANT SCHOOL

## News from Nursery

We have been very creative this month and acted out "We are going on the bear hunt" and "The Gruffalo". We continue to prepare for our Christmas Nativity with lots of singing and actions. We are enjoying learning new sounds and looking at different animals which hibernate over the autumn and winter. We have gone on our nature walk around our garden and spotted lots of different Autumnal objects.

#### Reception

We have been travelling far and wide during our topic from the bear cave to space and now into the arctic as we prepare for Christmas. The children had such fun going on a bear hunt with their rucksacks full of everything an explorer could want for. We took our poppies to the cenotaph in Carshalton and said a prayer as we quietly thought about the soldiers who lost their lives at war. As we prepare for Christmas we will be learning about Advent and the birth of baby Jesus. The children have been singing and saying their lines beautifully as we practice for Nativity concerts. We visited the post box to deliver our letters to Santa, we hope we will get a reply before we break up for the holidays!

#### News from Year 1

Our topic this term is all about 'The Enchanted Woodland'. The children had a fantastic time dressing up as their favourite fairy tale character for our fairy tale dress up day. The children have enjoyed reading various fairy tales which they have retold in their writing and role played. In Science, the children have been researching and identifying different types of common plants and trees. Alongside this they have also examined the different types of leaves and trees found in our school grounds.

## News from Year 2

This half term our topic is "Towers, Tunnels and Turrets" children have been learning about castles; focusing on castle life in medieval times. We have looked at different types of bridges and built and tested brides in our science and DT lessons. Thank you to all the parents who joined us for the building workshop. We all had great fun designing and building towers out of spaghetti and marshmallows. The children have also looked at timelines; creating our own timeline and one with major historical events in British history.

<u>Daily Mile</u> - Last week saw the launch of 'The Daily Mile' across the Infant school. We are currently doing this twice a week but as the year goes on and we begin to see the benefits this may increase. The Daily Mile was started in February 2012 by Elaine Wyllie who was head teacher of a large Scottish Primary school. She was concerned by the children's lack of fitness and, a few years after it starting it, she had shown it to be both sustainable and effective. The Daily Mile is very simple to start in a school. Without wasting time to change into kit, every child in the school goes out in the fresh air to run, jog or walk for 15 minutes. It is not competitive and most children average a mile, with some doing more and some doing less. It is not PE, sport or cross-country but a physical activity which is aimed at improving the children's physical, social, emotional and mental health and wellbeing. It can help children to focus and concentrate in the classroom and raise their attainment. As a school we are really excited about this new initiative and we are looking forward to the benefits it will bring to your child/children.

## JUNIOR SCHOOL

#### News from Year 3

Year 3 have been working hard on making their cushions and they finally finished! The children had a great time putting together their designs and seeing the final product. They have been embracing the autumnal weather by using our senses to create our own shape poems. Watch out for candyfloss clouds and skyscraper trees! Year 3 have been busy rehearsing for a number of things; our Penitential Service which is on Monday 5<sup>th</sup> of December in the school hall at 7pm and our Christmas Nativity on Tuesday 13<sup>th</sup> of December at 2pm and 7pm. 4 Rowan finished the block of year 4 assemblies by helping all pupils understand the different types of bullying and where to find them. They were fantastic!
